Currently, presenters include: biologist **David Scholnick** ("shrimp on a treadmill"), primatologist **Kimberley Phillips** ("take the monkey and run"), and anthropologist **Megan Tracy** ("food regulation system in China"). NIH Center for Scientific Review (CSR) Director **Richard Nakamura** has also agreed to present a poster on the NIH's peer review process.

Through this event, we will demonstrate the importance of "looking beyond the abstract" and highlight the value of this federally-funded research, through the lens of the scientists themselves.
